

# Lay Leader Report

As I write this day and article, a deadline looms. No, it is not Valentines Day, or Groundhog Day, or even preparing for the Sunday Birthdays and Anniversaries sing-along. It is the January 31, 2024, deadline for Desert Chapel to turn-in our application for a grant from The Health and Human Services Commission of the City of Apache Junction. We learned of this grant later in the process and then only through the efforts of our soon-to-be new member Kathy Highland.

Kathy approached me a few weeks ago saying; "This might be a great opportunity for Desert Chapel and our missions' programs." When I read the intent for the grant, I agreed. The overall grant is part of State and Federal programs to provide grant monies in the form of "Block Grants" for, in this case, financial assistance for agencies that provide services to the underserved populations of Apache Junction.

The Leadership Board approved that Desert Chapel apply for the above grant. The approval was to enhance the necessary upgrades and required health and safety measures needed for Desert Chapel to continue to operate our Community Feast and Clothing Closet missions. Specifically, to bring our facilities, namely Woeller Hall, and the south classroom building up to snuff.

The Leadership Board will be considering the potential impact of the grant, should we receive all or part of the requested funds. There is, of course, no guarantee that Desert Chapel will receive any of the funding for which we applied. Therefore, the board will operate within the confines of the 2024 budget approved in January.

The application for this grant forced us to take a good and deep look at our missions' programs and the facilities that support the missions. Regardless of the grant outcome, we will be financially and administratively challenged by age, the deferred maintenance, and the unforeseen uses of our facilities.

There are many people to thank for their hard work to complete and submit this grant application. At the risk of leaving (continued on the next page)

someone out, your Leadership Board deserves kudos for both examining the past budgets and carefully engineering a 2024 budget that is based in the real expected income from pledges, loose plate, unrestricted gifts, and dedicated gifts. Similarly, expected expenses were analyzed to provide a clear picture of the costs of Desert Chapel operations for 2024.

The grant is focused on Health and Human Services. That focus necessarily demanded that our Missions Leader, Nancy January and our Trustee, Ric Kayer, provide financial details and projections. Our Pastor Philip provided guidance to all of us from both the Pastoral and administrative perspectives. Ernestine Tesarek, Pastor's wife, has had experience with similar grant applications. She spent several long days and nights getting our rough submissions into the required grant format.

Earlier in the grant process, Kathy Highland was assimilating our rough data into the correct format when only days from completion, her computer went dark! This is when Philip and Ernestine jumped into the fray. Fortunately, Kathy was able to recover her work and electronically transmit it to the Tesareks.

A truly team effort no matter the outcome. Let's all pray that the grant reviewers are moved by the sincere devotion of our outreach ministries.

#### Here I Am Lord

Words & Music - Daniel L. Schutte, 1981

Then I heard the voice of the Lord saying, "Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?" And I said, "Here am I; send me!" Isaiah 6:8

The author writes about the Hebrew characterization, in the Psalms, of God as Lord of the sea, sky, snow, rain, wind and flame and yet a God who cares about the poor and oppressed - a God who is concerned about the well-being of each member of the human family. And, even though we feel unworthy and not equal to the task we, as members of God's family, hear Him calling us and respond with faith, devotion and positive action.

The Cyber Hymnal, in a Weekly Reflections' article, lists many of God's servants who are confronted with the idea of complete surrender to His will. It states that, "Here I am" is a formal Hebrew response of a servant to his master. After Adam's downfall he hid when his creator called his name. Despite his anguish at his failing, he still answered with devotion and commitment. "Here I Am".

When God called Moses from the burning bush, he also answered, "Here I Am" - the reply of an obedient servant. Isaiah gave the same response when he had the vision of seeing God and realized his own unworthiness. Mary told God's messenger that she was the Lord's servant and ready to accept an unimaginable awesome task. The Cyber hymnal states that obedience and love are interwoven, and we cannot love God without the obedience. When we answer God's call with "Here I Am" we leave our busy-ness, obligations and worldly pursuits and respond with sacrificial service. We don't just study the problems of the world but actualize our faith and say, "Here I am, Lord - ready to do Thy will".

The author was born in Neenal, Wisconsin, and was educated at St, Louis University, the Jesuit School of Theology at Berkeley, California And the Graduate Theological Union at Berkeley. He joined the Jesuits and served as director of liturgy on the campus ministry staff at Marquette University. He also was director of music at Immaculate Heart of Parish, Milwaukee, Wisconsin and then became director of music at the Lady of Lourdes parish in Milwaukee. He received an honorary doctorate from the University of Scranton.

I, the Lord of sea and sky, I have heard my people cry, All who dwell in dark and sin, my hand will save, I who made the stars of night, I will make their darkness bright, Who will bear my light in them, Whom shall I send? Here I am, Lord, is it I Lord? I have heard you calling in the night, I will go, Lord, if you lead me, I will hold your people in my heart.

Many people, from all walks of life, come on Saturdays for a good warm meal, fellowship and spiritual blessings.


